### Reproductive Health, Rights, and Justice: Canadian Webinar Series on Implementing the WHO Guidelines on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights for Women Living with HIV

Date: January 24<sup>th</sup>, 2018

In collaboration with the World Health Organization, Canadian Positive People's Network, Oak Tree Clinic, Women's Health in Women's Hands, Canadian Aboriginal AIDS Network, and the IBP Initiative Canadian Board Member Brittany Cameron presented during this webinar from her office located in Peterborough, Ontario.

The webinar objectives were to provide an overview of new WHO recommendations on elective C-section and safe abortion for women living with HIV as well as current research about the reproductive health of women living with HIV in the Canadian context using data from the Canadian HIV Women's Sexual and Reproductive Health Cohort Study (CHIWOS). To introduce guidelines and a toolkit developed by clinicians, women living with HIV and stakeholders for health and social service providers to support reproductive health and rights within a reproductive justice framework; including the newly updated Canadian HIV Pregnancy Planning Guidelines (2018) and the Supporting Mothers in Ways that Work: A Resource Toolkit for Service Providers Working with Mothers Living with HIV (2016).

In addition we aimed to gain insights from women living with HIV to highlight gaps in research and priority areas for further attention and to assist in the development of an action plan to support the sexual and reproductive health and rights of women living with HIV in the Canadian context, including actions to support the reproductive health, rights, and justice of women living with HIV.

## National Action Planning to Advance the Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights of Women Living with HIV.

### Date: Tuesday April 26<sup>th</sup>, 2018

In partnership with Department of Reproductive Health and Research, World Health Organization (WHO), Canadian HIV Women's Sexual and Reproductive Health Cohort Study (CHIWOS), Canadian Positive People Network (CPPN), Simon Fraser University, Women's College Research Institute, Women's Health in Women's Hands Community Health Centre, Oak Tree Clinic, BC Women's Hospital, Canadian Aboriginal AIDS Network (CAAN), Positive Living British Columbia, BC Centre for Excellence in HIV/AIDS and Implementing Best Practices (IBP) Initiative; Canadian Board Members Chantel Mukandoli and Brittany Cameron participated in an ancillary event at the 2018 Canadian Association for HIV Research (CAHR) conference held in Vancouver, British Columbia, in April 2018. Our goal was developing a National Action Plan to Advance the Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights of Women Living with HIV. This event brought together nearly 100 women living with HIV (WLWH), policy-makers, community workers, social workers, clinicians, students, and researchers from across Canada to discuss policy, programming, and research considerations that will lay the foundation for a national action plan to advance the sexual and reproductive health and rights of WLWH. Our four key discussion topics were as follows (1) Trauma- and Violence-Aware Care/Practice; (2) Supporting Safer HIV Disclosure; (3) Reproductive Health, Rights, and Justice; and (4) Resilience, Self-efficacy, and Peer Support.

The Eastern Opening Doors Conference Goals are to enhance local community capacity to provide effective counselling and support to people living with HIV. The conference aimed to meaningfully engage partnerships between service providers and people living with HIV. Additionally the conference promotes anti-oppression and the social determinants of health approaches to HIV related support and counselling. Day one of the event is solely intended for people living with HIV only.

Building directly upon more than a decade of collaborative organizing around women and HIV at International AIDS Conferences, the Women's Networking Zone (WNZ) is a community built forum within the International AIDS Conference and parallel to other global fora that is open to the public – and a place where community members, advocates, researchers, service providers, and decision-makers can meet, share, and learn together. Canadian Board Member Brittany Cameron hosted a session called "Self-Love, Self-Care" where we learned about each other and shared in a safe space how we can reduce burnout and depression by aiming for a


healthy body, mind and soul.

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### AIDS Awareness Week World AIDS Day Date: December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2018

World AIDS Day 2018 Parliament Hill, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada Speech by Brittany Cameron

In Canada it's estimated that over 14 thousand women live with HIV.

Today, I stand before you as an HIV Positive Mother, Wife, Daughter, Aunt, Ally and fellow Canadian. Like many of you, we as women living with HIV have hopes and dreams.

In 2009 research revealed that 69% of HIV Positive Women in Ontario, who are of reproductive age and wanted to get pregnant. 57% of those women had intentions to have a

baby. There are close to 4000 HIV Positive Women of Reproductive age in Ontario alone. The risk of an HIV Positive woman transmitting HIV to her baby with an undetectable viral load is zero. HIV Positive women can and do have babies. HIV negative babies. U equals U makes this possible. From conception to childbirth and beyond.

However on World AIDS Day we must not forget the women being left behind. Indigenous and First Nations women. African, Caribbean and Black women. Trans women. Women who use drugs. Women engaged in sex work. Women who are incarcerated. Young womem ans girls. There are many systemic barriers my sisters face that prevent them from becoming undetectable and we must continue our work to dismantle those barriers and the stigma to ensure access for all women.

We must ensure that as women we all have the right to equitable and accessible sexual and reproductive health care, that includes access to birth control and access to safe and legal abortion, however providing the right health services to those who need them, in itself, isn't enough. If we are to achieve equity, and to ensure the right to health for all, we need to work beyond the health system. The broader policy and social environment continues to play a critical role in shaping our epidemic and facilitating or hindering effective responses.

Support our right to make informed choices about our bodies and our right to celebrate sexual pleasure. Increase, improve and guarantee access to HIV. Assure that we are well represented in science and research. Invite us to the decision making table.

Today I encourage toy to ask yourself what you can do to make Canada and your local communities a place where all women living with HIV, live free from gender oppression, where we realized and claim our full rights inclusive of sexual, reproductive, legal, social, economic and health rights.

Our sisters are still dying. The time to act is now. No more excuses. Educate yourself. Get an HIV test. Listen to the stories of the women in your community. Let them guide you. Stop the stigma. Call out the violence. End the silence.
